

Insight Report EDITION 3

ANALYSIS

- Amid ongoing farmer protests over inheritance tax changes, DEFRA faces mounting industry concern about Sustainable Farming Incentive funding and the recent closure of capital grant schemes due to budget constraints.
- School food policy remains a key political battleground from the Children's Wellbeing Bill amendments to Scotland's meal debt cancellation and the Holiday Activities and Food programme extension.

POLITICAL INSIGHTS

- DEFRA announced £7 million investment across five food security projects at <u>TUKFS' Annual Conference</u> in York, bringing together DEFRA, FSA, FSS, and key stakeholders to address systemic food challenges, with Minister Daniel Zeichner MP announcing an expanded funding framework.
- Secretary of State Steve Reed MP's <u>Oxford Farming Conference speech</u> restated DEFRA's £5 billion commitment to support farmers' transition to nature-friendly methods, and announced new monitoring of public sector food procurement with a 50% British, local, and environmental sourcing target.
- Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill <u>progressed</u> to committee stage, with amendments tabled on universal primary school meals, secondary breakfast clubs and auto-registration for free school meals. DfE <u>published</u> guidance for early adopter breakfast clubs.
- Committees for Advertising Practice (CAP) will now <u>strengthen industry guidance</u> ahead of October watershed implementation for food and drink advertising, triggering a further consultation phase.
- The Office for Environmental Protection's latest progress report <u>highlights</u> slowing environmental progress, emphasising nature-friendly farming as top priority and calls for a Land Use Framework.
- EFRA Committee <u>launched</u> dual scrutiny initiatives, accepting evidence on fairness in food supply chains until 24 January, while conducting a second oral evidence session with DEFRA officials on farming future.
- Around 30 MPs <u>engaged</u> in backbench debate on the impact of food and diet on healthy weight, building on Lords' inquiry report.

MEDIA INSIGHTS

- Farmer protests continued to dominate media coverage of government's "<u>New Deal for Farmers</u>".
- Scottish Greens' <u>£3 million school meal debt cancellation</u> sparked UK-wide debate on school food policy implications.
- Keir Starmer and Education Secretary Bridget Phillipson came under fresh pressure over children missing out on free meals, with MPs questioning the <u>exclusion of auto-enrolment</u> in the new Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill.
- HFSS advertising regulations and obesity debate receives <u>increased attention</u> following parliamentary discussions and strengthened guidance announcements.
- <u>The Observer reported</u> that DfE will continue funding the Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme.

CIVIL SOCIETY UPDATES

- Health coalition of 80+ organisations <u>call</u> for improvements to Healthy Start scheme, backed by high-profile support from chef <u>Tom Kerridge</u>.
- Several environmental charities <u>expressed concern over</u> <u>loosening planning regulations</u> to support expansion of megafarms and intensive production units.
- New "<u>Bridging the Gap</u>" film launched showcasing successful projects integrating organic and local produce into low-income communities and schools.
- Lidl GB became the first UK supermarket to <u>commit</u> to increasing fibre as part of new healthy sustainable goals by 2030.
- Migrant farmworkers <u>staged</u> first London protests over labour conditions under the Seasonal Worker scheme.
