

# Policy Insight Report

### ANALYSIS

- The Land Use Framework consultation has opened, marking the beginning of a process which may significantly reshape the allocation of land for agriculture and food production across England.
- Latest evidence from the Food Foundation and the National Preparedness Commission highlights systemic vulnerabilities in food security on a global, national and household level, while the UK Climate Change Committee's latest government advice emphasises crucial role of dietary shifts in meeting carbon emission targets.

#### **POLITICAL INSIGHTS**

- <u>Land Use Framework consultation</u> is now open. A critical 12-week 'national conversation' engaging stakeholders across agriculture, business and conservation sectors. Submission deadline is 25 April.
- DEFRA SoS Steve Reed announced procurement reform at NFU conference, requiring 50% of public sector food to be UK-sourced or meet equivalent standards, targeting £5bn in contracts. Further announcements include the securing of <u>capital grants</u> funding for 2025/26, increases in <u>HLS payment rates</u> and plans to roll out an improved Countryside Stewardship Higher Tier (CSHT) scheme this year.
- NFU's #StoptheFamilyFarmTax campaign gathered 270,000 petition signatures, triggering a <u>parliamentary</u> <u>debate</u>, whilst major <u>supermarkets</u> join opposition over food security concerns. The Prime Minister discussed <u>balancing</u> NHS funding with tax considerations while emphasizing the government's commitment to the sector.
- <u>National Preparedness Commission</u> delivers stark warning on UK food security vulnerabilities, citing climate change and global insecurity, and calling for immediate legislative action to strengthen supply chain resilience.
- The government has published a response to the House of Lords' Food, Diet and Obesity Committee report, <u>prompting disappointment</u> from Committee chair Baroness Walmsley and Obesity Health Alliance members.
- Ministers have confirmed <u>holiday activities and food</u> (HAF) programme will continue from April, but funding beyond next financial year is subject to spending review. Meanwhile, Scotland <u>committed</u> to expand free school meals to S1-S3 secondary pupils in receipt of Scottish Child Payment in 8 local authority areas.
- DEFRA SoS Steve Reed <u>confirmed</u> that the rapid review of the Environmental Improvement Plan (EIP) has been carried out, setting the stage for a revised EIP later in 2025.
- Expansion of <u>Devolution Priority Programme</u> adds six new regions under mayoral devolution, affecting 8.8 million.
