

ANALYSIS

- The upcoming 10% tariff on UK exports to the US signals potential trade tensions that could significantly impact British agricultural producers, at a time of existing supply chain vulnerabilities and price fluctuations.
- Farmers and food sector leaders have responded with calls for protection of domestic interests, while industry leaders noted cascading effects on rural communities and food security.

POLITICAL INSIGHTS

- UK farming sectors are preparing for a 10% US export tariff, while industry leaders <u>urge</u> protection of British agriculture interests in trade talks. <u>Concerns</u> have been raised over influx of cheaper imports with lower standards, with Henry Dimbleby <u>commenting</u> on implications for rural communities.
- UK officials are <u>reportedly</u> open to EU alignment on meat and dairy regulations, as well as European Court of Justice oversight ahead of May 19 UK-EU summit.
- DEFRA's latest food strategy stakeholder update notes engagement events starting in late May/June, the formation of a Citizens' Advisory Council, and the development of a 'food system outcomes framework' later this year.
- NFU has called for £5.6 billion Treasury investment for food security and border controls ahead of Spending Review.
- Government data shows 28% of children (4 million) in material deprivation with food bank usage rising.
- Public health minister Ashley Dalton <u>clarified</u> the forthcoming 9pm watershed and online restrictions on HFSS product advertising.
- Basic Income for Farmers (BI4Farmers) campaign's <u>open letter</u> co-signed by farmers and MPs, called on DEFRA to reinstate the Sustainable Farming Incentive, and introduce a basic income for agricultural workers.
- Former NFU President Baroness Minette Batters <u>appointed by DEFRA</u> to lead a farm profitability review as part of the government's New Deal for Farmers.
- The <u>EFRA Committee letter to DEFRA minister on 23 April</u> requested clarification on several points related to both the future of farming, and fisheries
- Parliamentary office POST has issued a new <u>briefing on cultivated meat</u>; DEFRA has published <u>updated agricultural</u> <u>data</u> on land use, crops, livestock and workforce.

MEDIA INSIGHTS

- The <u>Guardian</u> exposed how an orchestrated attack to discredit the EAT-Lancet report on sustainable diets sought to ignite culture wars. A new report is due later this year.
- BMJ <u>investigated</u> lobbying related to councils implementing local healthy food advertising policies.
- <u>Guardian</u> reported that large companies' HFSS food/drink advertising spend rose 26% in 2024, ahead of new restrictions set for October 2025.
- <u>LBC</u> published an opinion piece on public institutions' potential to support local food systems, by Julian Boys of the Centre for Local Economic Strategies.
- <u>BBC Panorama</u> aired an investigation into baby food pouches.

- A new Nesta report <u>warns</u> the government against shifting obesity strategy focus from HFSS to ultraprocessed foods.
- The Food Foundation explores the nature of corporate lobbying on food in this report and podcast.
- Youth activist organisation Bite Back <u>exposed</u> levels of outdoor junk food advertising in several cities, and staged a billboard takeover.
- A National Education Union survey <u>finds</u> that 63% of teachers use personal funds to pay for students' food.
- Riverford's <u>Wicked Leeks blog</u> explores the potential to scale up sustainable public food procurement.
